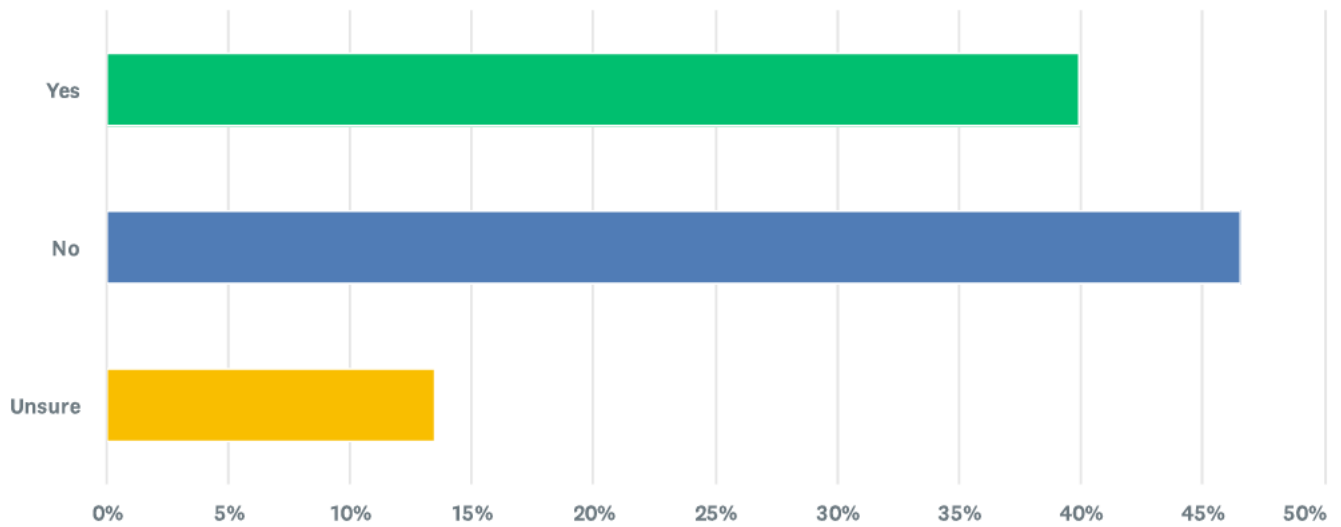

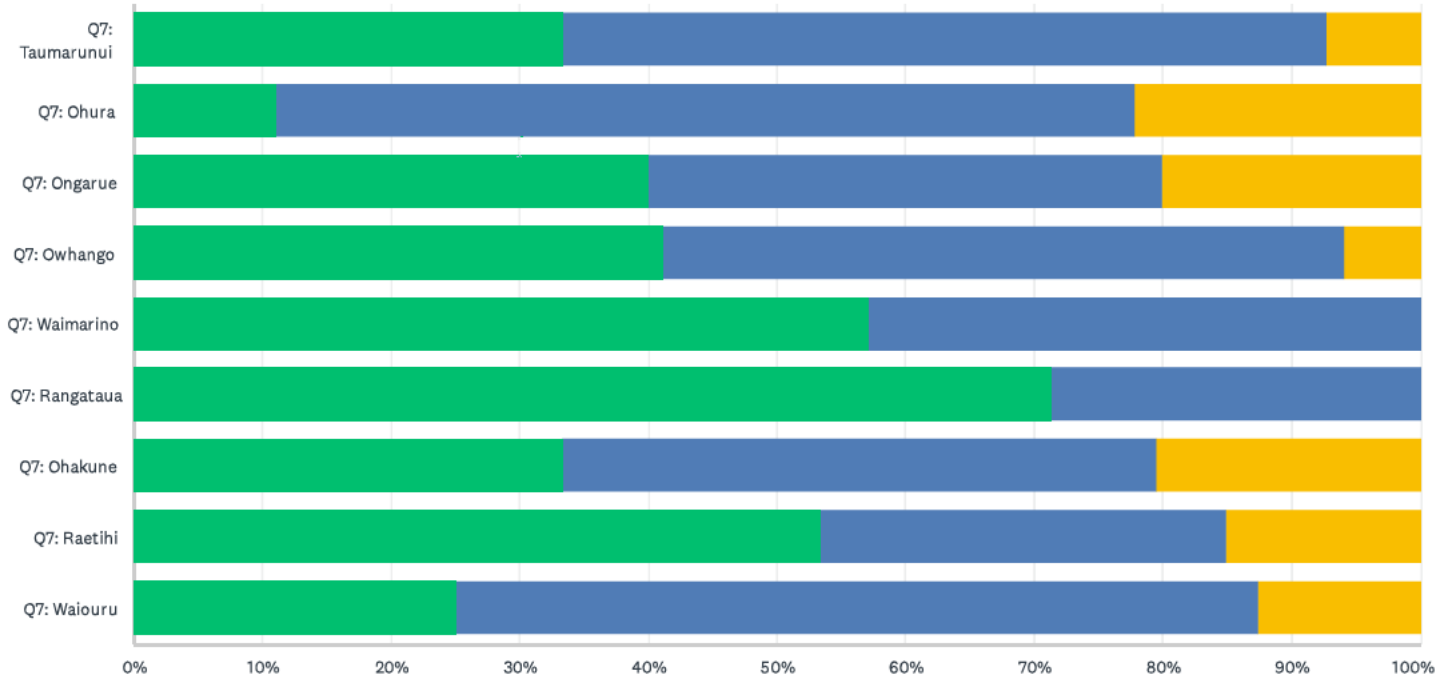

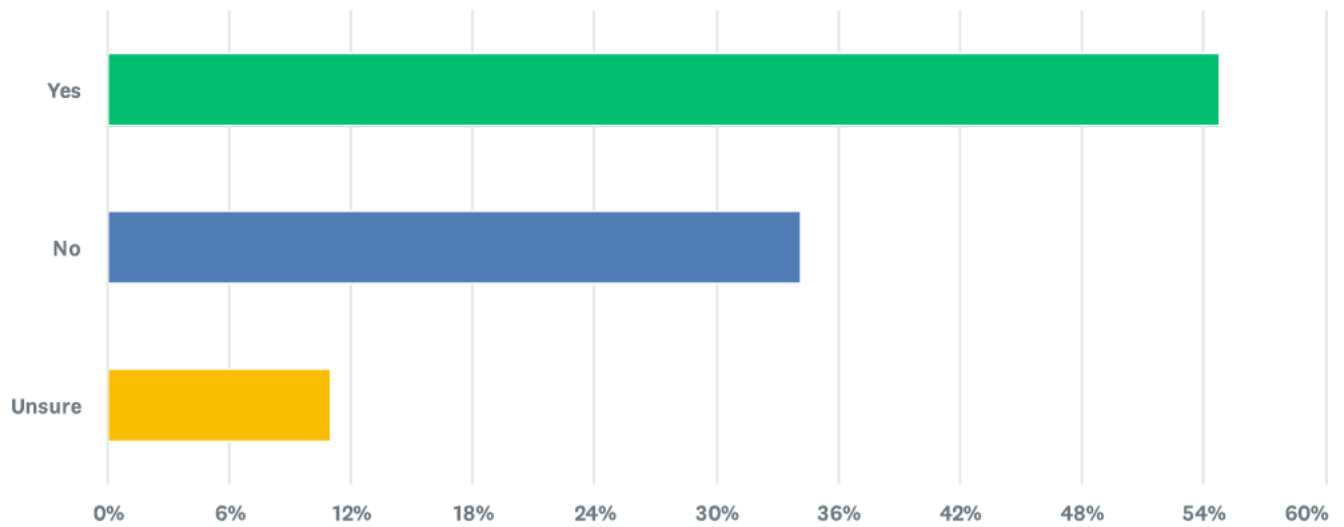

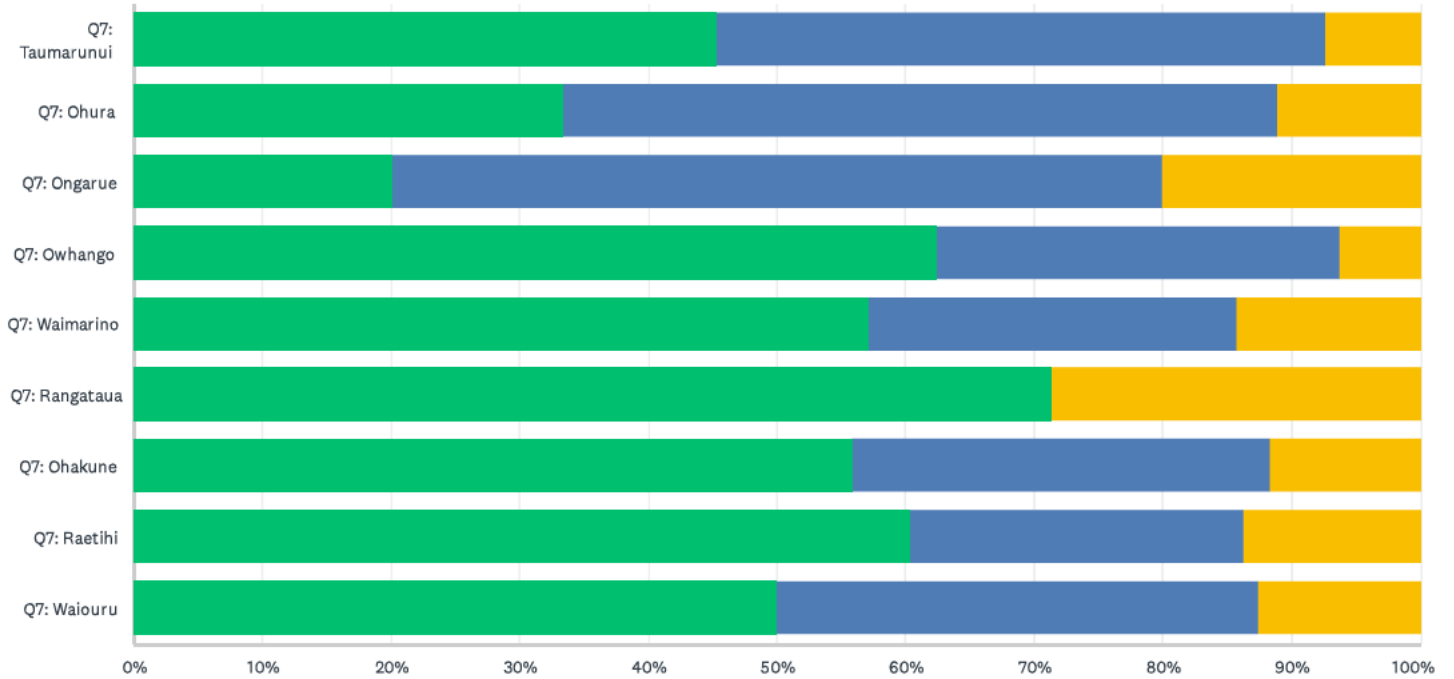

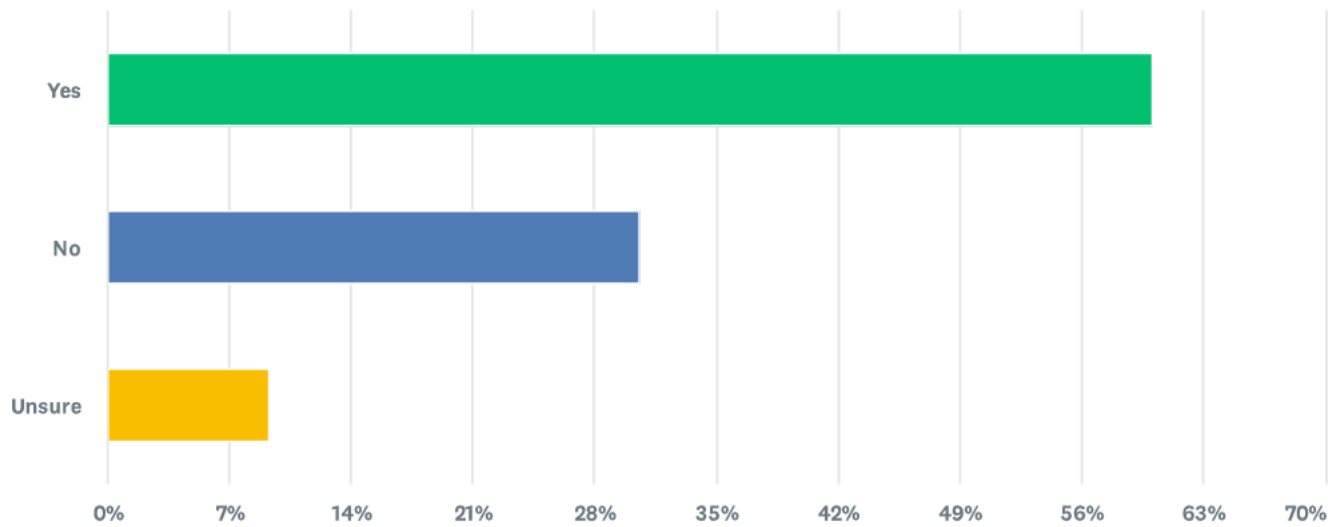

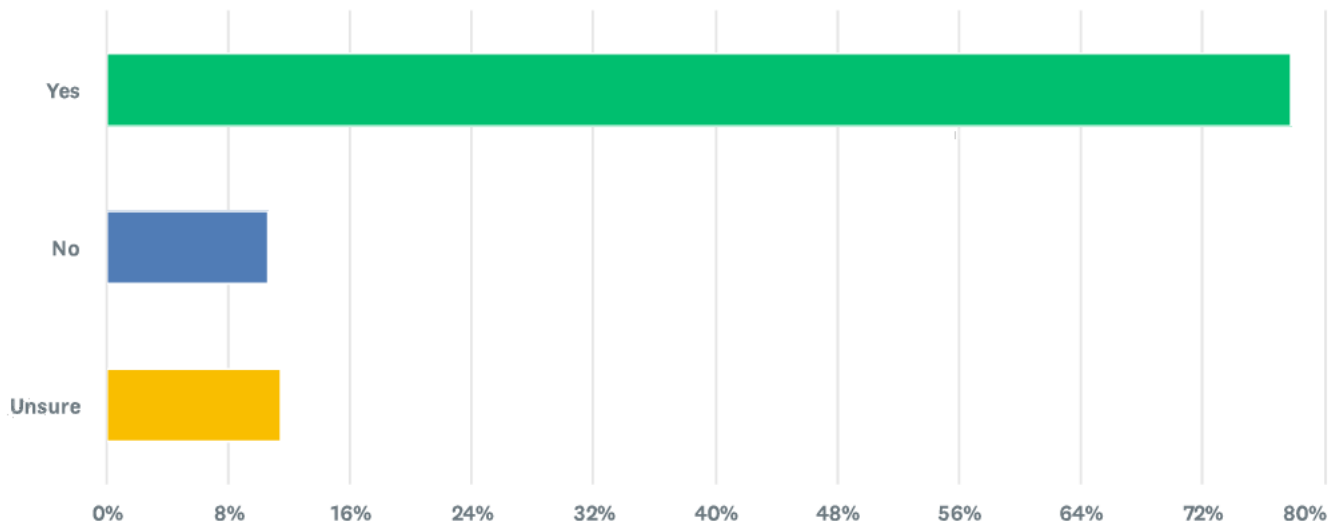

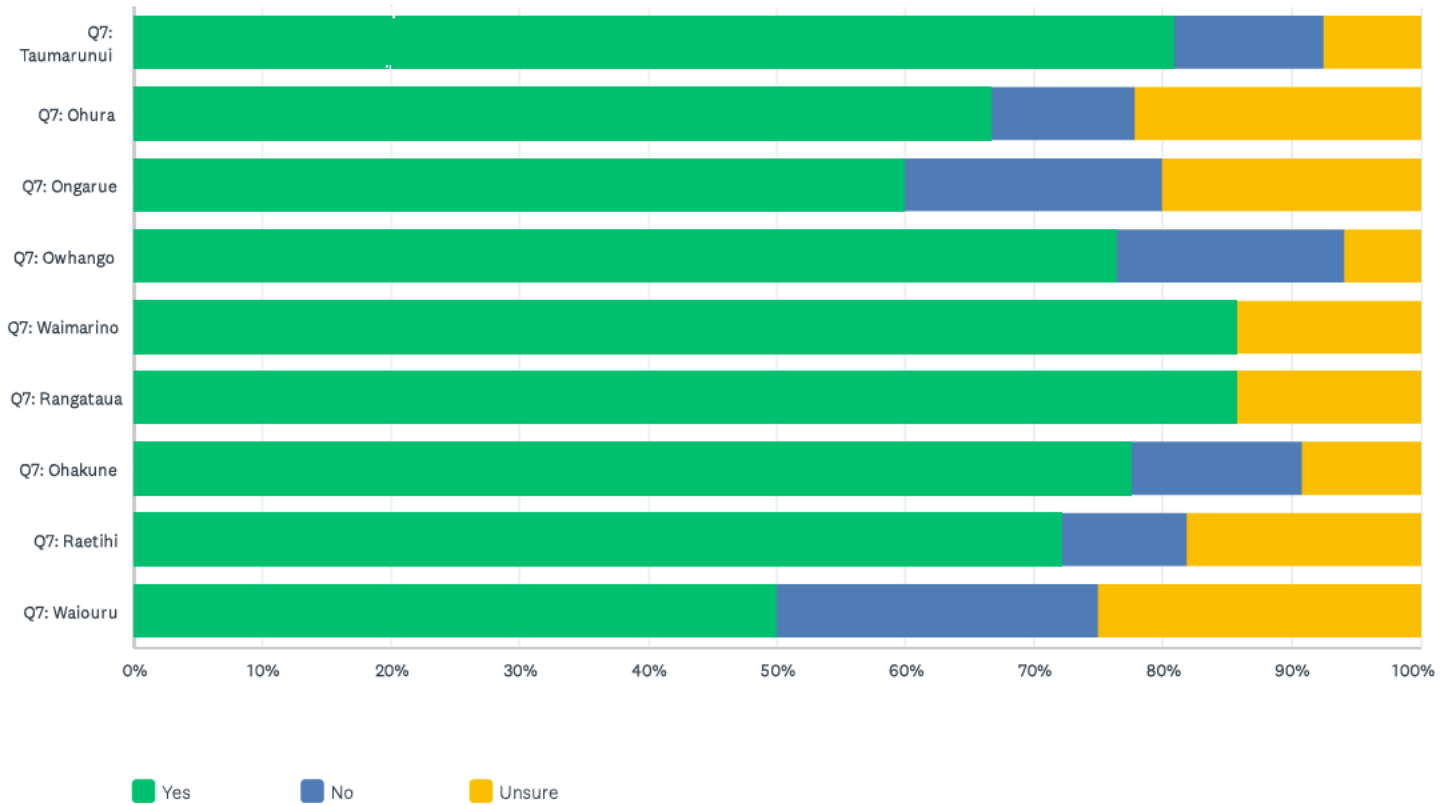

They are essential to protecting our infrastructure, communities, waterways and ratepayers from increasingly frequent and costly events. Our district has already experienced earthquakes, flooding, slips, severe weather, disrupted roads and pressure on rural water infrastructure. Cutting preventative work may reduce expenditure today, but it will expose ratepayers to much greater repair and recovery costs tomorrow. Council itself acknowledges that the cost of doing nothing is likely to be greater than investing early. Council should establish clear, measurable climate and resilience priorities for every community—not only the main centres. Smaller and isolated communities such as Kāhaki require locally designed plans for drinking water, emergency communications, backup energy, road access, fire resilience and support during extended disruptions. Environmental planning must also involve mana whenua and hapū from the beginning. Mātauranga Māori, whakapapa relationships with whenua and waterways, and the knowledge held by ahi kā should help shape priorities, monitoring and action. Engagement should not be limited to large organisations or occur after decisions have effectively been made. I support investigating a disaster reserve, provided it is transparent, protected for genuine emergencies and developed alongside insurance, government co-funding and other options so that the burden does not fall unfairly on households already struggling with rates. Council cannot call climate change a growing risk and then consider withdrawing the very work needed to understand and manage it. Maintain the current services, strengthen practical community resilience, and report publicly on progress and outcomes. Your survey is actually making the argument that climate risks are becoming more frequent and severe and that doing nothing will probably cost more. 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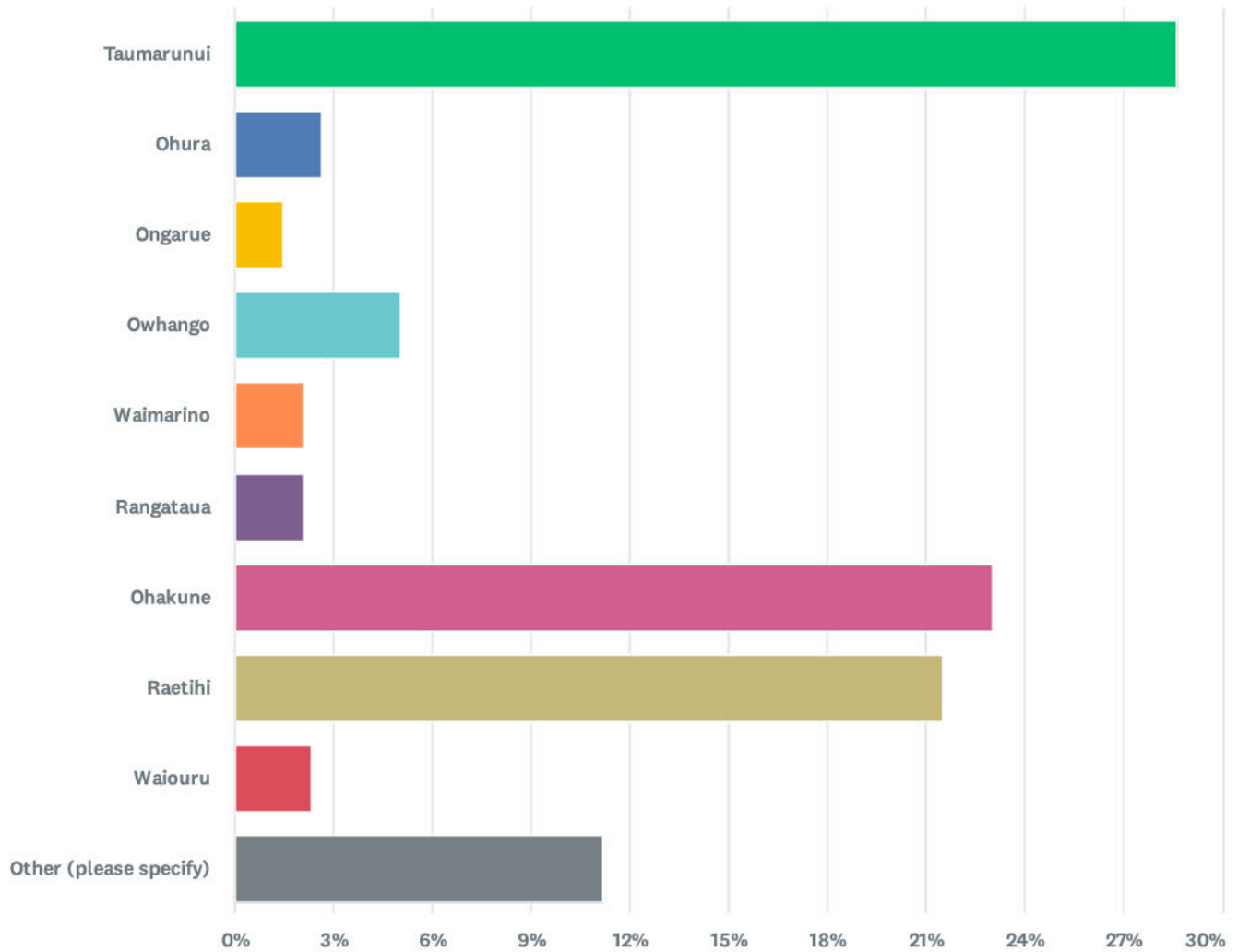

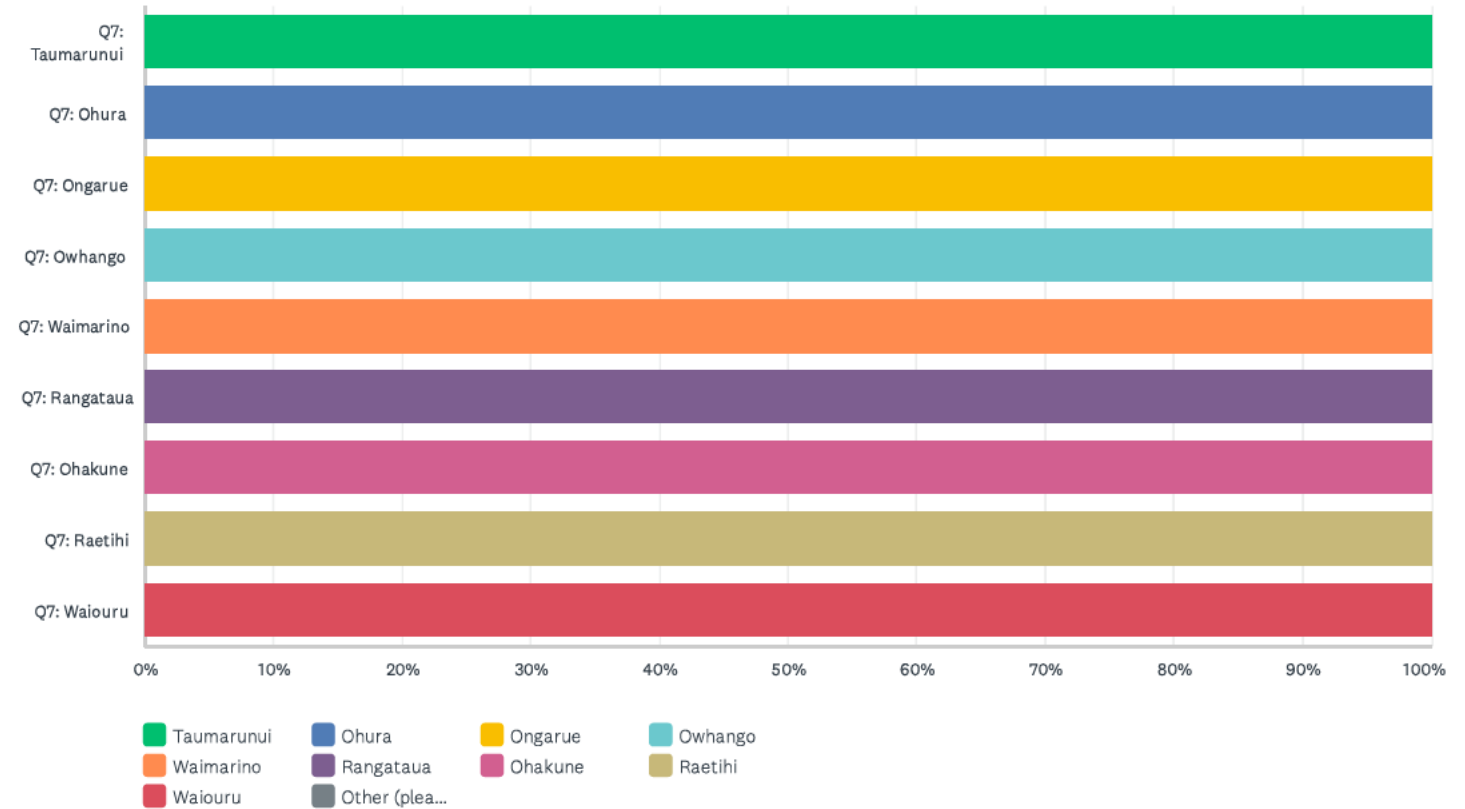
