#### **Ohakune Carrot**

Not so much 'Don't miss' as 'Impossible to miss', this roadside tribute to Ohakune's biggest crop was erected in 1984 and quickly became one of NZ's most hugged 'Big Things'.



Carrots were first grown in the area during the 1920s by Chinese settlers, who cleared the land by hand and explosives. Ohakune now grows two-thirds of the North Island's total crop.

#### The Carrot Park

The Carrot Park, developed through the fundraising efforts and hard work of local community groups Ohakune 2000 Inc. and Ohakune Growers Association, and supported by Council, was officially opened on 1 October 2016. Four years in the making, the park sees Ohakune's famous giant carrot joined by some cartoon vegetable friends including a swede, potato, and Brussels sprout and parsnip. The cartoon veges have been fashioned out of high-density polystyrene and then fibreglassed. Information boards about vegetables, Chinese growers and forestry pay homage to the district's history. A heritage path with bricks name the many growers who have been part of the Ohakune community over the years.



#### **Facilities**

The Carrot Park offers excellent public restrooms and a mobile van and caravan wastewater dumping station



## **Playground and Walking Tracks**

The Park also offers short walks, picnic spots alongside the meandering Mangateitei Stream, a bike pump track, a bmx track, a playground and a Mazda carrot car carved out of a log of old-man pine.
